In five years, over \$750,000 has been donated to uphold our local community. The number of local nonprofits served through Give to Grow Match Day has grown from 21 the first year to 52 in 2021.

The Sabetha Community Health Foundation is a not-for-profit entity formed to help raise money for Sabetha Community Hospital so that they can continue to provide the best care possible with the most up-to-date equipment. Receiving donations totaling over \$25,000, plus the very generous match donation of over \$11,000 we received, makes our goal to help support Sabetha Community Hospital so much easier. The generosity of local people who continue to donate every year, along with the opportunity to receive matching donations at the annual Give to Grow day has added a new excitement in giving. We can never thank the community enough for thinking of us when they make their donations. And a very big thank you goes out to the people who find it in their heart to donate money to be put into a matching fund for Give to Grow. This has been such a plus the last 3 years. Donations received by Sabetha Community Health Foundation over the past couple of years, as well as a donation from the Wilfred Banks Estate, have been used to help the Sabetha Community Hospital upgrade equipment and computer programs for the Radiology Department. A portable X-ray machine, a new bone density machine and a 3D mammography machine are some of the equipment that has been purchased with these funds. I was thrilled with the response and the generosity and know Peggy would have been as well. Including the match this year, we were able to raise over \$4,800 with our current balance now sitting at nearly \$17,400. We greatly look forward to awarding a scholarship to a Sabetha High School senior later this spring.



# **2021 GIVE TO GROW CHALLENGE WEEK**

The sixth annual Give to Grow event was a great success. Thanks to a generous pool of 16 matching donors who together gave \$105,000 to encourage giving, new records were set! At the end of the week of giving, \$252,009 in donations were received via the online portal, in the mail and in person. After adding in the prorated match, \$357,009 was raised for 52 local nonprofits.

New organizations this year: Sabetha Area Medical Relief Fund, Grains for Hope Foundation, NorthRidge Family Development Scholarship/ Support Fund, Sabetha Food Pantry, Peggy Brant Scholarship. \$35,276 was raised for these new funds! \$252,009 in gifts received, plus \$105,000 in matching dollars \$357,009 total raised
