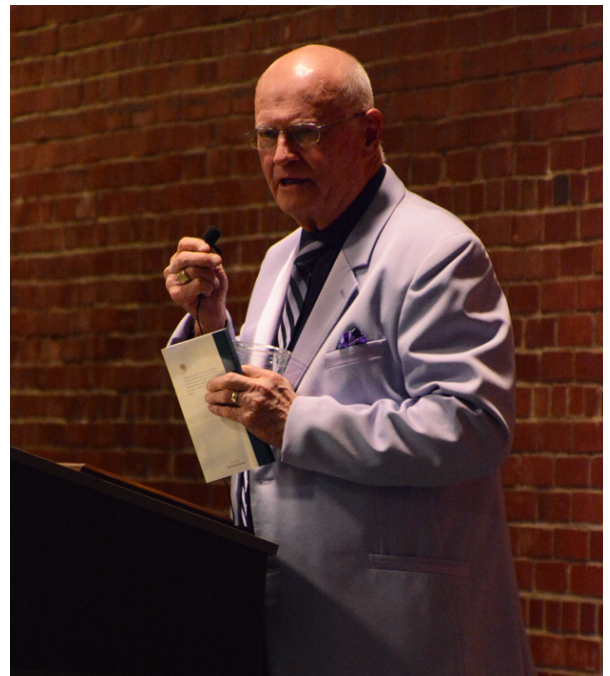

COMMUNITY CELEBRATION GALA

On January 13, 2024, the Greater Sabetha Community Foundation hosted the annual Community Celebration Gala. Each year, this event is planned to celebrate the recent Give to Grow Match Day results and other community successes. In addition, GSCF nominates nonprofit organizations that have “Served Sabetha Strong.” This award is given to those who have exemplified the meaning of Community, Compassion, and Commitment through actions and deeds. This year, The Main Event, Neighbor-2-Neighbor, and My Sister’s House were honored. In addition, the Sabetha Chamber of Commerce presented its Business of the Year award to HydraBed. The public was invited to attend the Gala to enjoy the feeling of community and were treated to a beautiful table of heavy appetizers and dessert prepared by Sheri Lay and team.

This enjoyable evening was made possible due to the generosity of KSi, Schenck Process, and HydraBed.



NEW OFFICE SPACE

The Greater Sabetha Community Foundation has been serving the Sabetha area since December 2015. In those 9 years, the GSCF has not had a place to call “home” except a home office, coffee shop, and even a laundry room turned office space. Although these places serve their purpose, having a space we could call our own has always been a dream.

A former dentist’s office sat for sale on North 9th Street for some time. Leslie, now Director of Partners, had the idea of approaching the owners to lease the space. As supporters of the foundation already, they were happy to create a partnership and lease the perfect building. At 1100 sq feet, this space consists of a waiting room, office, meeting room, kitchenette, bathroom, and clean basement for storage space. The GSCF Board of Directors approved a \$6,000 budget for outfitting the space with new furniture, paint, and decor. Volunteers and the board of directors have given their time to move items, assemble furniture, and paint the space. They held their first board meeting in the new office on October 8th.

Not only does this building provide a “shingle” in the community, but it also provides the perfect place to easily meet with donors, new and current funds, and non-profit organizations. We are also excited to host partner trainings and meetings for our community in the coming year. A quarterly “coffee & conversations” will be held for all established funds to discuss community needs and how they can work together to meet them.

We look forward to all the benefits this new building offers to GSCF and the community as a whole. The new office space is located at 112 N. 9th Street, Sabetha, KS 66534.

GRANTS TO THE COMMUNITY

WENGER MAREL CHARITABLE GRANTS

Sabetha Middle School, Library Seating Enhancement, \$24,237: Sabetha Middle School will use these funds to update the furnishing in the library to provide an additional functional space for student and teacher use. New furnishings will provide an alternative area to increase peer to peer learning, collaboration, and student engagement.

My Sister's House, Bathroom Remodel, \$18,850: My Sister's House will use their award for a full bathroom remodel. They plan to convert their current tub to a shower, replace the current toilet, add a new sink, add new cupboards, and increase the lighting.

Sabetha Emergency Management System, Power Load Cot System, \$26,618: Sabetha EMS used their award to purchase another Power Load Cot System, reducing strain on crews and protecting patients. With a 3-truck fleet, one ambulance currently has this system, leading to higher mileage and wear. Adding another allows them to rotate their fleet and extend the life of their ambulances.

The Main Event, Audio/Visual Package, \$31,569: A most critical enhancement needed was a PA system, microphones, fixed and portable speakers, and video projection capabilities. By providing an exceptional and inclusive experience for all, they can continue to foster vibrant and accessible spaces that benefit the entire community.

Brown County Humane Society, Kennel Expansion \$25,000: Grant dollars are planned to finish a 1,200 sq ft room that will allow for 9 more indoor/outdoor kennel spaces at the shelter. They plan to finalize the heating/cooling, electrical, plumbing, and concrete. They will also purchase a few items such as a sink and chain-link panels to enclose the bunks.

Northridge Family Development Center STEAM Enhancement \$32,000: The goal is to provide extra enrichment activities to the children in their care, to enhance their development and introduce them to new skills and experiences. It will also allow them the opportunity to learn from more than one teacher throughout the day.

Sabetha Playground Partners \$25,000: Sabetha Playground Partners raised funds for an inclusive, accessible playground at Sabetha Library Park. The current structure lacks accessibility, limiting use for many. The new design will provide features for all ages and abilities, including those with physical, cognitive, and social disabilities. The new playground is set to be installed this summer 2025.

LUNCH LADY ANGEL HUG GRANTS

This year, four grants totaling \$2,916.23 were distributed to help meet urgent needs:

- Three families received rent and utility assistance.
- One individual received new tires for their car, enabling them to start a new job and transport their children to school.

What is a Hand-Up-Grant (HUG)?

A HUG (Hand Up Grant) is a needs-based, one-time financial assistance grant (with a potential one-time renewal determined on a case-by-case basis) designed to help individuals facing immediate challenges, such as car repairs, dentures for an elderly person, or tuition for the first class at a technical college. These grants are available as needed, and applications can be submitted anytime online. The Lunch Lady Angels also participate in Give to Grow Match Day, providing an opportunity for your donations to be matched and make an even greater impact. 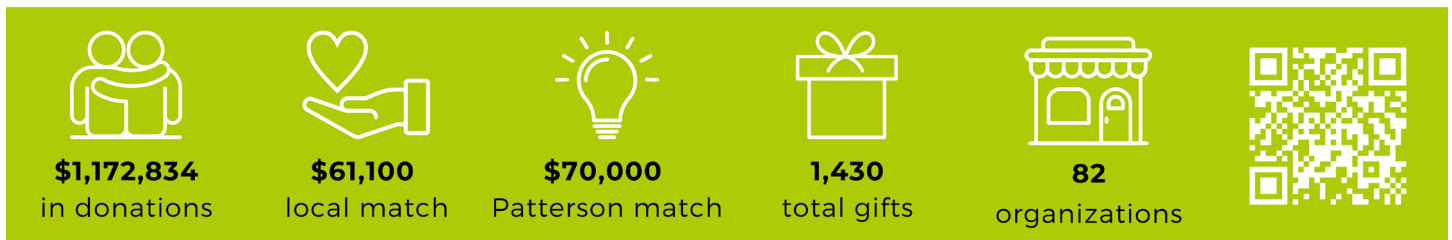
2024 GIVE TO GROW MATCH DAYS

The 9th annual Give to Grow Match Days, held November 20-22, shattered previous records thanks to the generosity of 19 matching donors and the support of the Patterson Family Foundation, which contributed \$70,000 in matching funds. Together, these efforts brought the total matching dollars to an impressive \$131,100.

By the end of the giving period, donors contributed \$1,172,834.65. After the matching dollars were applied, the final total reached an astounding \$1,303,934.65. This achievement reflects 1,430 gifts made to support 82 charitable organizations.

“The first year we gave to Give to Grow, we wrote a check from our checking account. Leslie explained to us that as farmers, we could use the Gift of Grain option to give and benefit two-fold. By using Gift of Grain, we are not showing an income from the sale of the grain, but we get to use all the deductions for producing the crop. Simply put, it is a smarter way to give. All we have to do is tell our participating elevator how many bushels of grain we want to sell, and they send a check to the foundation.



We get the fun of choosing how to disperse the money on Give to Grow Day. We enjoy giving to multiple funds and typically, we give to ones that are memorial scholarships or ones that we have been involved with in the past. CAPACITY BUILDING GRANT

In a small but vibrant community, where local organizations were striving to make a difference but facing challenges, the Patterson Family Foundation (PFF) saw an opportunity to help. With a mission to support the work of community-based nonprofits, the PFF launched its Capacity Building Grant (CBG)—an initiative designed to strengthen the structures of organizations, helping expand their reach and impact.

The CBG was more than financial aid—it gave local nonprofits the tools to thrive. While many had strong missions and dedicated staff, there were still holes left unfilled. PFF addressed these gaps by providing guidance on organizational processes, leadership, and sustainability. They connected nonprofits with experts in strategic planning, fundraising, and program evaluation while funding staff training, technology upgrades, and long-term growth initiatives.

The Greater Sabetha Community Foundation (GSCF), a key supporter of local projects, was a recipient of this grant. With CBG support, it hired a full-time executive director to drive strategy, strengthen partnerships, and improve project management. This leadership helped the GSCF better coordinate efforts and expand community outreach.

“The Patterson Family Foundation’s Capacity Building Grant has allowed us to take our work to the next level,” said Connie Joy, Executive Director of the GSCF. “By giving the foundation a full-time leader, we’ve been able to grow our impact, focus on sustainability, and continue supporting the programs that make Sabetha a great place to live.”

Ways to Give

DONOR ADVISED FUND

A donor-advised fund (DAF) at the GSCF is easy to establish, allowing donors to simplify and consolidate their giving while remaining actively involved in recommending grants to nonprofit organizations. It provides a way to build a tradition of charitable giving within a family, with many donors involving children/grandchildren as advisors during their lifetime or as successor advisors in the future. Donors may recommend grants to any 501(c)(3) public charity in the United States, with the foundation conducting due diligence to ensure compliance with IRS requirements. By handling all administrative details, the foundation enables donors to focus solely on their philanthropic goals.

ESTATE PLANNING

Planning your estate is a way to give back to your community. Donating through GSCF supports local charities for years through grants.

You can give cash, stocks, real estate, life insurance, or retirement assets, which are tax-free for GSCF but taxable for heirs. Contact us to learn more.

GIFT OF GRAIN

Your crops sustain your livelihood—your gift of grain can sustain your community. Donating grain through GSCF is a way to make a lasting impact while reducing taxable farm income. Your gift can support a nonprofit or broader charitable cause in the community. Give today to help grow the future.

REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION

A required minimum distribution (RMD) is the amount you must withdraw each year from your tax-deferred retirement account once you reach a certain age. If you have an IRA, 401(k), or similar plan, you delayed paying taxes on your contributions, but you'll need to pay taxes when you withdraw the money. The RMD amount changes yearly based on your age and account balance, and if you don't take the required amount, you could face a 50% tax penalty. To avoid taxes on your RMD, you can donate it directly to charity through GSCF. Consult your financial advisor, tax professional, or attorney for guidance.
